What we've been doing

20 February 2018

Nightingale Triangle

This was a continuation of work done at the BFNHS task session on Saturday 17 February. A large amount of material, mostly holly and *Rhododendron ponticum*, was left over from the previous session, and volunteers worked to burn this material. We then continued the clearance of *Rhododendron* and holly and burned this material on the bonfire. A large group of 14 volunteers attended; we were very pleased to welcome a new volunteer. Several volunteers from BFNHS and local residents attended. The weather was overcast.

Previous visits

The last BCV session at this site was on 6 February 2018. The group again cleared *Rhododendron* and holly.

Nightingale Triangle project

This patch of woodland in Harmanwater is bounded by Firlands, Nightingale Crescent and Bagshot Road. The site had become heavily overgrown with invasive species such as *Rhododendron ponticum*. BFNHS is working with the Council's landscape contractors, Continental Landscapes, and local volunteers to improve this woodland. Unusually for BCV, BFC rangers are not involved in this project.

Nightingale Triangle: flora and fauna

These are preliminary remarks gleaned from visits to the site: some of the identifications need confirmation.

Trees at the site include a number of oaks, perhaps English oaks (*Quercus robur*); although at least one Turkey oak (*Quercus cerris*) is present. There are many Scots pines (*Pinus sylvestris*); at least one large Western red cedar (*Thuja plicata*) and birches (*Betula* sp.). There is at least one young yew tree (*Taxus baccata*). Oddly, there does not seem to be any hazel (*Corylus avellana*). There is a fine beech tree (*Fagus sylvatica*) near the Bagshot Road. Some alien shrubby species, perhaps naturalised from nearby gardens, are present: these include snowberry (*Symphoricarpos albus*) and *Kerria japonica*. An *Amelanchier* sp. may be present, but this needs checking. *Rhododendron ponticum* grows all too luxuriantly; there is a small amount of Portugal laurel (*Prunus lusitanica*)
A number of rather spindly examples of the native soft shield fern (*Polystichum setiferum*) are present, these may do better as the light improves.

There is widespread growth of the silver-leaved variety of yellow archangel (*Lamium galeobdolon* ssp. *argentatum*) near the Firlands entrance. Although yellow archangel itself is a valuable ancient woodland indicator plant, this subspecies is of garden origin.

Nuthatches were very vocal during the BCV task. Jays are also present, very noisy and obvious at this time of year. The woodland at this site looks like it would be a suitable habitat for tawny owls and great spotted woodpeckers.

Warfield Environment Group (WEG)
